

## **Muskie Stocking Questionnaire**

The Executive Committee of the LMA initiated an email survey in response to a DNR proposed initiative to increase the muskie stocking from 800 to 1400 fingerlings. Our survey was sent to the 277 members for whom we had email addresses. This approach was used due to the short period of time available to obtain the information before muskie stocking would take place. Here is the wording of the survey sent out:

### **To: Lake Miltona Association Members**

Muskie catch statistics from last spring's DNR population assessment indicate population abundance has declined and there are fewer young fish in the population. These results indicate that the DNR management objectives to maintain the muskie numbers for Lake Miltona are not being met. Stocking was reduced from 1,400 to 800 fingerlings every other year beginning in 1999. This reduced numbers of fingerlings stocked was in response to an agreement with No-More-Muskie to maintain rather than further increase muskie numbers. Since population abundance has declined, if production is available, the DNR wishes to restore the stocking rate of 1,400 fingerlings every other year until such time that management objectives are satisfied.

We are polling our membership to see if they support this DNR

conclusion. Do you support increasing the stocking rate from 800 to 1,400 fingerlings every other year?

**Yes,** I support increasing the stocking rate

**No,** I do not support increasing the stocking rate

Please reply to this email before October 7 so we can tabulate the results of this survey and send them to the DNR before stocking would take place this fall.

### **The results of this survey were as follows:**

"No" = 81 (73% of emails returned);

"Yes" = 30 (27% of emails returned);

Failure to reach recipient= 28 (10% of total emails sent);

emails from members not on our LMA original mailing list = 3

The total number of email responses = 280 for an overall response rate of 40%.

At their October 8, 2011 meeting the Board of Directors of the Lake Miltona Association recommended we send these results to Dean Beck, our DNR contact for the stocking activities in Lake Miltona for his consideration. He appreciated our input and asked us to please relay that the DNR has made a decision to defer the higher stocking rate this year. Although they feel the justification is sound, there is discomfort in proceeding with the increased

stocking given the compressed time period for broader public review. Dean said he would put out a general news release next spring in hopes of generating more discussion and input. He also asked if he can attend a Board of Directors meeting to go over the information and address concerns and comments our membership may have forwarded. If there is a decision to bump up stocking, it would occur next fall.

Jerry Wendlandt and Dean Beck prepared a white paper on the muskie stocking question entitled "Muskellunge Stocking Quota Adjustment, Lake Miltona, Douglas County" which contains documentation of the fish population in Lake Miltona. Dean Beck sent us a copy of this paper in a Microsoft Word format. If anyone would like to have a copy of this paper please request one from one of the LMA Directors.

## **Smoke Signals From The Camp**

Smokey Timbers is slowly and reluctantly going into at least partial hibernation following the best season yet since the Camp's "rescue" in 2004 and transfer of ownership to the Smokey Timbers Foundation in 2009. Over 1240 guests were hosted at the Camp this season, a wonderful increase of nearly 60% over 2010 which, a year ago, was thought to have been a great year. Even more encouraging is the increasing diversity of groups discovering Smokey Timbers to be a destination of choice – school science groups, high school sports teams, faith-based activity groups, service family gatherings, youth day camps -- in addition to the historic Boy and Girl Scout organizations, church groups, 4Hers, and family gatherings. Reservations for 2012 are already building impressively and it is increasingly apparent that Smokey Timbers is becoming recognized as the unique asset that its supporters have always known it to be.

The annual fish fry for Lake Association members was held on August 6th this year and turned out to be a most interesting and gratifying experience. The day started off with an unbelievable, nonstop rain deluge that continued as the event was scheduled to start. While preparations for rain were in place, incredibly worried organizers could not believe it when guests began arriving despite the ongoing downpour. One of the early arrivers commented, "Smokey Timbers is too important; we would not miss this." What an uplifting statement! As guests continued to arrive, the rain

stopped, the skies cleared and, when all was done, the Camp experienced its most successful fish fry fundraiser ever. The Foundation is very grateful for the support demonstrated that day, particularly given the conditions experienced. Beyond that day, the Foundation continues to sincerely appreciate the ongoing support of the Lake Miltona Association and the numerous lake residents who regularly support the Camp and its programs in so many different ways – contributions, donations of goods, and volunteer services.

This Summer/Fall season concluded with a most interesting program provided for by a grant to Smokey Timbers by WesMin R C & D with funding made possible by Tastefully Simple of Alexandria. The program enabled Lake Miltona Assn. Water Quality volunteers, Douglas County Soil and Water and DNR personnel, and Parkers Prairie H.S. biology faculty to provide the school's sophomore students with training that enabled them to carry out relevant explorations of Lake Miltona water ecology. On Oct. 10th students were boated and/or driven to a variety of sites to collect their data. Following analysis of their data, the students will prepare reports, presentations and materials for distribution of their findings. Students at the Miltona Science Magnet School, Lake Miltona Assn. members and lake residents, and others interested in lake ecology will benefit from their efforts. It is envisioned that, perhaps, an ongoing relationship could develop with these students that would support Miltona's Lake Management Plan long term.

The reference to "partial hibernation"

in this article's introduction refers to the Camp's continuing interest in developing cross-country ski trails on the grounds. Weather permitting this fall, it is intended that the Camp's trails be conditioned for trail grooming. The grooming equipment and a groomer volunteer are in place. All that is required is some preliminary trail improvement and Mother Nature's cooperation in providing adequate amounts of groomable snow. The intent is to provide locally accessible, groomed, free-will contribution, and perhaps even lighted trails for traditional cross country ski enthusiasts.

Fundraising, of course, continues to be a major challenge for the Smokey Timbers Foundation. While significant progress has been made in retiring the debt inherited with the transfer of ownership, annual principal and interest payments still make vigorous pursuit of the Camp's worthy objectives difficult. The Foundation found it necessary to renegotiate its debt obligations this past year. While making the obligations more manageable, of course the length of the burden needed to be extended. The desire to retire (a.k.a. eliminate) the debt, and pursue better use of the Camp's resources, however, is always foremost.

## **Does Foam on the Shore of a Lake Mean it's Polluted?**

The foam found in lakes and streams is usually natural. Wind-driven currents frequently create parallel streaks of foam in open water that accumulate along windward shores and in coves. Foam is created

as decomposing plants and animals release organic compounds into the water. The compounds reduce the surface tension of water, causing bubbles to form. Many people blame shoreline foam on detergents, but detergents don't create long-lasting foam since they quickly lose their sudsing

ability. Industrial pollution effluents may have been a more common source of foam on surface water in the past, but these days point source discharges are more closely regulated through the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits.

## **Walleye Stocking Report**

The Lake Miltona Association works with the DNR on walleye stocking plans to achieve a balance of all species. The DNR normally stocks walleye fry in the spring and walleye fingerlings in the fall based on the results of previous fall electro-shocking tests. The DNR electro-shock survey in September 2011 yielded a young walleye rate per hour of 112, substantially higher than the 15 per hour rate in August 2010. As a result, the Lake Miltona Association will reduce its walleye stocking plan from 600 pounds to approximately 340 pounds of fingerlings for late 2011 by


using funds donated to LMA and a supplemental match from Viking Sportsmen of Alexandria.

The DNR planned to stock 2.8 million walleye fry in Lake Miltona in 2011. The actual fry stocked was approximately 2.9 million.

Generous contributions from our members, sportsmen's clubs, guide services and tournament organizers, has allowed us to fund over \$24,000 in fry and fingerlings in the last five years. At the end of 2011, we expect to have a walleye stocking fund balance of about \$2,800, or less than one year's reserve to be used when stocking resumes. Your

contributions over the years have effectively populated Lake Miltona with a healthy supply of yearling and second-year class walleyes. Many 10 to 15 inch walleyes were caught and released this summer to sustain an acceptable population of walleyes in the lake.

The Lake Miltona Association board of directors will again consider a plan to continue to participate, subject to DNR approval, in the Viking Sportsmen matching program. The quantities of fingerlings and fry stocked in Lake Miltona may vary based on an optimum use of resources and management of the walleye population.
