A Message from the President

Lake Miltona started the summer with the rain falling and falling. It gave us great lake levels for most of the season. However, Mother Nature has a way of throwing us weird ways to bring us back to average. The rain quit in August, and we watched the lake levels drop approx. 16-18 inches during late summer early fall. So again, we need winter moisture to bring us back to normal.

The Lake Association membership has remained strong this year. We are at

a very healthy level of members but can always use your help to remind new people moving in to our area, the many things the Miltona Lake Association does for the lake. Pass the word to join.

We are very excited to report that we have stocked walleye's this fall. We put in 1000 lbs of walleye fingerlings in October. This amounts to approximately 30,000 fingerlings. Fingerling's average 4-7" in length, so decent sized fish to get a good start on the fishery. This is a decrease of 500 lbs, from the previous year. The board wants to try to increase our stocking to 1500 lbs annually, but that is an additional \$10K annually to raise. So, please remember that as you receive your dues letters, donating to the fish stocking fund goes directly

into fish that go into our lake. Fishing was much improved last summer. We had many reports of improved fishing on our lake the past summer with multiple sizes of walleyes being reported. We are convinced that to continue good fishing, we need to restock regularly.

The LMA is short, one board member from the Dittburner Creek road area 11. So, if you are in this area and want to learn what a director's position involves, please feel free to reach out to me and I can let you know what is involved in being a board member.

Keep warm this winter and see you on this ice.

State of the Fishery on Miltona

The results from the Standard Survey conducted on Lake Miltona in August of 2023 show promising signs for anglers.

Lake Miltona is well known as a quality Walleye fishery. However, the previous Standard Survey from 2019 showed record low walleye abundance. The 2023 survey showed 10.8 fish/gill net. That is considered high in comparison to Miltona's lake class. Normal range for lakes of this class is 4.0-9.6.

The increase can be attributed to increased survival and recruitment of young fish in recent years. Nearly 2/3 of the gill net sample was comprised of Walleyes age 3 or younger. These fish would be in the foot long or shorter range. The aggressive "cigars" you caught last winter, or the 13 inchers you caught this summer. The mean size of Walleye captured in 2023 was 15.2 inches and 1.4 pounds. This size fish is approximately 4-5 years old.

Fall electrofishing for young of year walleyes from 2015 through 2018 failed to find any young walleyes. 2019 yielded a modest catch rate of 16/hour. That was encouraging news in the 2019 Status of the Fishery, and the return to "abundance" is welcome news. Lake Miltona supports a popular Muskellunge fishery. The trophy potential is relatively high on this lake. Angler reports and survey findings indicate fish exceeding 50 inches are not uncommon. There has been a tagging study of muskies on Miltona. Several fish have been tagged in the last few years. There was also activity on Miltona regarding a diet study on Muskellunge. Largemouth and Smallmouth bass are also popular species on Miltona. In the 2023 Standard Survey, the largest smallmouth bass sampled was just shy of 19 inches. Largemouth are more abundant. Average length of Black Crappie in 2023 was 9.2-10.6 inches. Average length of Bluegill was 5.3-6.3 inches. Northern Pike are not abundant - 2/1 fish/gill net. The size structure has improved. Lake Miltona is located in the North-Central Zone for Northern Pike regulations. Anglers can keep up to 10 pike but not more than two can be over 26 inches in length. All pike between 22-26 inches must be released. The largest pike measure in the 2023 survey was almost 33 inches. The next Standard Survey is tentatively scheduled for 2027.

The dues and contributions to our fish stocking, and invasive species fund are critical to the Association's ability to address the needs of the lake and keep adding to our walleye population. This year we recorded 398 members compared to 412 in the prior year.

Douglas County Lakes Association

The Douglas County Lakes Association works to support, coordinate and promote county-wide environmental and educational efforts relating to public waters, including groundwater, lakes, streams and lakeshore.

The mission of the DCLA is to support member associations by coordinating and leading county-wide environmental and limnological efforts; to provide governmental and regulatory liaison; and to promote education, public awareness and advocacy of lake and lakeshore issues. We work to amplify association voices.

As a member of the Miltona Lake Association, you are also a member of the DCLA. Each lake association in the DCLA puts forth one member to serve as a DCLA board member. All members are welcome to attend the board meetings and all members vote at the annual meeting. Board meetings are held the second Wednesday of each month in person April - October. Winter board meetings are held virtually, as needed.

One of the priorities of the DCLA for 2025 is to launch a Lake Steward program. Stewardship refers to actions of individuals and communities that influence and maintain lake health. Current land uses, important social values, human commitments, society investments, natural resource management capacities and political willingness to prioritize lake health, all have an influence on how resources are managed. For lakes, additional factors influence stewardship outcomes.

The Lake Steward program was established by Minnesota Lakes and Rivers Advocates. The Lake Steward program empowers homeowners to evaluate their practices and take incremental steps to protect our waterways for generations to come. Through this neighbor-to-neighbor interactive initiative, we're fostering commitment and pride in the natural beauty of shorelines that absorb runoff, stabilize soil, and provide essential habitat for Minnesota's treasured wildlife.

A lake is not a swimming pool. Help maintain Lake Miltona as a lake designated as "Exceptional Use". Become a Lake Steward.

Foam On The Water

On a few fall mornings, we've noticed some foam on the calm waters. It almost looks like dish soap bubbles, or a bubble bath along the shore and floating in patches. It is concerning, but is it worrisome? What is it?

Most of the foam that we see on the surface and shorelines of our lakes happens naturally. The surface tension of the water decreases and air mixes into the water. Notice we see the foam on calm waters, following a windy wavy day? Natural organic compounds from decaying plants (notice how the weeds die back in Autumn) can reduce the surface tension. Mix those with air from wind, waves or water flowing, bubbles are produced and can build up into larger sections of foam.

Some human products like detergents can cause foam that is similar in appearance, but dissipates quickly. Natural foam can stick around for awhile and build up. Natural foam may smell like dead fish, or soil while detergent foam may smell like soap, or perfume.

Regardless whether foam forms from natural causes, pollution or a combination, it can pose a health risk. Surface water foam can contain algae, viruses, bacteria, parasites, decaying organic matter and other contaminants. If swallowed it can pose a health risk to people and pets. Don't make a "Santa Beard" on your chin from lake foam!"

Smoke Signals from the Camp

The Smokey Timbers Camp ended another successful season with the "Trail of Treats" and "Spooky Hike" Halloween activities. It should be noted, while this is the seasons last activity, the camp is available for use year-round. The camp was fortunate to have many wonderful guests (young and older) who not only camped but also took part in the many mini camps and Fika get-togethers. Many hours and resources were donated by volunteers who were instrumental in helping achieve the camp mission.

The camp's mission is to provide camping, outdoor experiences, fellowship and learning experiences for youth, families and neighbors. The mission was accomplished. There were over 1800 camping guests at the camp this season of which about 60% were kids. Mini camps and Fika get-togethers also provided additional activities for all ages.

Each Wednesday morning, during the summer, a Fika (Swedish for morning coffee break and treats) get together was sponsored to provide fellowship for neighbors and friends of the camp. While fellowship is the main objective of Fika, various presentations were also provided such as the history of The Minnesota Club.

Mini camps were also held that provided learning and enrichment activities. These usually took place on Wednesdays at various times of the day depending on the activity. A few examples of the many camps that were offered this past season included Lake Surfing for Kids, Ukrainian Inspired Eggs, Sourdough for Beginners, Foraging for Wild Edibles and Woodcarving a Cardinal. In August, the annual fish fry was held. It was a success. We would like to thank all who participated and made good will donations to the camp.

The season wrapped up, once again, with the Halloween "Trail of Treats" and "Spooky Hike" which were held on October 26th. Both were a huge success even though the temperatures were cool. The Trail of Treats is for the younger kids and was held in the afternoon. Approximately 230 youngsters, along with their families and friends, participated. The Spooky Hike was in the evening for the older kids who were looking for a "SCARY" experience. There were over 300 participants and their expectations were met! Both were a success! The Smokey Timbers board would like to sincerely thank all the sponsors and volunteers who provided time, funding and supplies that helped make this a success!! There are too many to name all of them.

Several projects were completed or are underway in addition to normal maintenance. An irrigation system was installed and the lawn revitalized around the main buildings (see picture). This project became possible because of a generous donation from the Mammel Foundation, who has been a longtime supporter of the camp.

The older outdoor shower building and deteriorating playhouse have been removed. The area previously occupied by the shower building will become an outdoor cooking area. The playhouse will be replaced with new playground equipment. The new playhouse equipment will be joined by an already installed "9 Square" game.

Looking ahead, the "possible" first event planned for 2025 is a Winter Fun Day. At this event, kids and families can enjoy winter activities including hiking, skating, snow shoeing and kick sledding. This outing is being planned for February-March 2025 depending on weather. Check the smokeytimbers.org web site or Facebook page the beginning of 2025 for specifics.

Smokey Timbers Camp is a year around facility and is available for winter use (think cross country skiing, snow shoeing and other winter activities)! The campgrounds include four units that have heating capabilities as well as a heated restroom/shower facility. The grounds include many trails along with lake access on over 20 acres.

Once again, Smokey Timbers Camp would like to sincerely thank the Lake Miltona Association, the many lake residents, and friends of the camp who have provided support to the camp. The financial donations not only help offset the operating costs but provide support for capital projects and unplanned maintenance. Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS)

In Douglas County lakes, the following types of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) have been identified: Zebra Mussels, Eurasian watermilfoil, Curly-Leaf Pondweed, Flowering Rush and Signal Crayfish. Fortunately, at this point-in-time, only Zebra Mussels, have been identified in Lake Miltona.

In 2025, Lake Miltona is scheduled to be surveyed. The county manages this work by contracting with an aquatic plant surveyor. For Lake Miltona, the purpose of the survey is to detect AIS early so that appropriate mitigation efforts can begin. In the event new invasive species are found, the county and DNR will work with the lake association to develop an action plan.

AIS can be spread to lakes too easily. To mitigate spread, state law requires docks, boat lifts, weed rolls and swim rafts to be out of water for 21 days before being put into another body of water. The DNR continues to ask that precaution be taken by cleaning your watercraft, draining all water, and properly disposing of unused bait.

If you find AIS please do the following: note the location, take a photo of the specimen and keep it in a safe place for identification, take the specimen to the DNR office in Fergus Falls or contact Mark Ranweiler, the MN DNR Aquatic Species Specialist for our county. Dittberners Creek Culvert

Lake Miliona is recognized for its walleye fishing some of which is financially supported by our Board of Directors. Both the water quality and the walleye population are adversely impacted by the current Dittberner Creek's culvert under Dittberners Creek Road in the following ways: First, the effluent from the culvert impinges the downstream bank thereby causing erosion of the bank and depositing unwanted silt downstream. Second, the elevation of the culvert exit is so high above the downstream pool and the water velocity exiting the culvert is so great that spawning walleye and other fish are blocked from upstream spawning.

Both problems are addressed by a Conservation Partners Legacy (CPL) grant proposal for upgrading the Dittberners Creek culvert. A grant has been completed by Jerry Haggemiller of the Douglas County Soil and Water Conservation (DCSW). The project will involve installing a 12-foot by 7-foot reinforced concrete box culvert. The current culvert will be kept in place as an overflow pipe for full flow conditions. The proposal states: "The MN DNR, Lake Miliona Fisheries Management Plan specifically mentions the replacement of the culvert on Dittberners Creek as an important milestone in its operational plan...Thus, the intent of this project is to improve fish passage and provide additional spawning habitat for Lake Miliona's fish community... It will also address ongoing erosion issues that have increased the sediment load into Lake Miliona and are causing silt to be deposited in the spawning area."

The total grant amount requested is \$307,412. This grant will require a 10% match. The Lake Miliona Association (LMA) has reviewed this CPL Grant Program application by the DCSW for upgrading the Dittberners Creek culvert. A letter has been sent to the DNR in support of this project. The results of the CPL review process will be available late this year. We anticipate providing some of the matching funds required if the grant is approved.

Lake Miliona Walleye Stocking Report

We received a permit to stock 1000 pounds of walleye fingerlings from the Minnesota DNR last October. We witnessed the weighing of the fish and witnessed putting them into the lake this beautiful October. With the fish length of approximately 4-6

inch fingerlings, we put in around 24-35 fingerlings per pound. So, the total amount of fingerlings put in was about 35,000. With the DNR limited on stocking due to budgets, we want to continue our supplemental stocking of Lake Miliona to ensure fish are being put in annually on a consistent basis. For the 2025 year, the board would like to go back to stocking 1500 lbs, but the money has to be there to support the commitment to increased fish levels. Please consider donating extra money with your dues to our fish stocking account. We need the membership to financially support the stocking with your donations, or we will not be able to sustain increased levels. Fishing has definitely improved over the past few years, and we are convinced that our stocking makes a big difference in the quality of fishing in Lake Miliona. We are seeing many sizes of Walleye's being caught, so this shows us that our continued, year after year, stocking levels has helped ensure that we have a healthy fishery.
